**B. CURRENT REQUIREMENTS AS IT APPEARS IN THE CATALOG?****Special Education K-12 Post-Baccalaureate Certificate of Completion**

Prepares K-12 special education candidates at the graduate level with specific training in the areas of disability assessment, inclusive education strategies, current law and implementation of programs including development of legally defensible individualized IEP documents.

Graduates will have mastered all of the requirements for initial certification standards for special education teachers foundations in special education, development and characteristics of learners. Individual learning differences, assessment, intervention strategies, current law and implementation of programs including development of legally defensible individualized IEP documents. The program will provide training to those who already possess or are eligible for, a current Alaska teaching certificate or a bachelor's degree with the necessary prerequisites with specific training in the area of special education. The program will provide training to those who can effectively address state and national educational issues appropriate to their field of study. Those that are not from Alaska. Special education candidates will progress through a variety of developmental learning experiences for all ages, types and levels of disabilities. All candidates will have opportunities to gain experience in the field of special education. All those who complete the program will provide evidence of meeting the National Council for Exceptional Children content standards at a beginning special education level.

The program, which shares a strong common core and has the same credit requirements with the ones within the special education major of education program. IIAA and IAAE provide implementation/consultation models and programs developed in conjunction with general Semantics consulting programs that provides resources for Alaska licensed K-12 special education teachers.

Individuals who prefer candidates have the option to teach core classes to students who qualify for special education at the secondary level.

**Special Education K - 12 Post-Baccalaureate Certification**

Prepares K-12 special educators at the graduate level with specific training in the foundations of special education, assessment, interventions strategies, current law and the implementation of programs, individualized education plans, legally defensible IEP documents.

Graduates will have mastery of the ethical for Exceptional Children standards for special education teachers: foundations in special education, development and differentiation of students with learning differences, instructional strategies, learning environments and social interactions, communication, instructional planning, assessment, and evaluation information. The program is eligible for a current Alaska teaching certificate or a bachelor's degree with the necessary specific training in the area of special education. The program prepares K-12 special education teachers who can effectively understand state and national education issues and respond appropriately to those with respect to Alaska. Special education candidates will progress through a series of experiences designed to build their experiences for all ages, types and levels of abilities and collaborative environments. This program is not teacher education. The program will provide evidence of meeting the national certification requirements. The program will meet the Alaska content standards at a beginning special education teacher.

The program, which shares a strong common core and has the same credit requirements with the special education master of education programs at UAA and UAS, provides development in multicultural education models and program development in multicultural settings. Completion of this program meets requirements for Alaska licensure as a K-12 special education teacher.

Most of the changes in this program change are editorial and will not have an impact on budget, space or faculty only.

The addition of EDSE F678, Special Education Clinical Practice, fulfills the mandatory proficiency

Faculty -- This course will become a part of an existing faculty member's workload. Field supervision responsibilities will increase for this instructor.

Budget -- As enrollment in the program increases an additional faculty member will be needed to assume the extra supervision responsibilities.

Space -- The course will utilize existing university classroom, video and/or audio conference room will be necessary.

#### Justification for adding EDSE F678 Special Education Clinical Practice:

The Special Education program added an initial teacher program beginning Summer 2011. The program is designed for people who have a bachelor's degree in a related field but have not taken the required teacher preparation program for elementary or secondary education and are not certified teachers.

Students admitted to the program are required to have education practice prior to graduation. This experience working with special needs children and have passed the Praxis I and II exams. Since students admitted to this program are not certified teachers, the impact of accreditation is larger.

The original thought of the department was to simply have students register for EDSE F678 Special Education Clinical Practice twice (3 credits each) in two different semesters. However, there is not a clear way to represent this in the catalog. Also, certification departments and schools districts may not see the course as distinct from the student's first semester of clinical practice.

To be perfectly clear to admitted students that they are required to be in a clinical practice setting for two semesters, the addition of "EDSE F678 Special Education Clinical Practice" is proposed.

Rewriting the catalog entry and adding the new course to the catalog for students is more confusing for students to sift through the catalog and find relevant information. It is recommended to determine which applicants do not qualify for specific requirements for two separate semesters admissions questions and degree requirements. Questions can assist in this in the future.

Please note that the only degree requirement that is changing is the addition of EDSE F678. All other changes are editorial.
